Introduction

You look at your credit card statement. 877-(419)-3468 There it is. A charge from Norton 360. 877-(419)-3468 But you do not remember buying anything. 877-(419)-3468 Or you thought you canceled months ago. 877-(419)-3468 Or you only signed up for a free trial. 877-(419)-3468

Your first question is simple: Why is Norton 360 charging me? 877-(419)-3468

The Most Common Reasons Norton 360 Is Charging You

Here are the eight most common reasons Norton 360 appears on your statement:

1. Automatic renewal. This is the number one reason. 877-(419)-3468 You bought a one-year subscription. 877-(419)-3468 Norton automatically renewed it for another year. 877-(419)-3468 They charged your saved credit card. 877-(419)-3468 This is legal, but easy to forget.
 2. Free trial ended. You signed up for a 30-day free trial of Norton 360. 877-(419)-3468 You forgot to cancel. 877-(419)-3468 On day 31, Norton charged you for a full subscription. 877-(419)-3468
 3. You have multiple Norton 360 subscriptions. You bought Norton 360 for your PC. 877-(419)-3468 Later, you bought Norton 360 for your phone. 877-(419)-3468 Now you have two separate subscriptions. 877-(419)-3468 You are paying for both.
 4. You upgraded without realizing it. Norton offered you a "free upgrade" to Norton 360 Deluxe or Ultimate. 877-(419)-3468 The first month was free. 877-(419)-3468 Then Norton started charging you the higher price. 877-(419)-3468
 5. A family member used your card. Your spouse, child, or parent bought Norton 360 using your credit card. 877-(419)-3468 You did not know about it. 877-(419)-3468 The charge shows up on your statement.
 6. You have an old Norton account you forgot about. You bought Norton 360 five years ago using a different email address. 877-(419)-3468 That account still has auto renewal turned on. 877-(419)-3468 Norton keeps charging you every year.
 7. Norton charged you after you canceled. This should not happen, but it does. 877-(419)-3468 A glitch in Norton's system. 877-(419)-3468 Or you canceled the wrong subscription while another remained active.
 8. It is not actually Norton. Scammers sometimes put "Norton 360" on credit card charges to look legitimate. 877-(419)-3468 You may have been scammed.
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How to Identify Exactly Why Norton 360 Is Charging You

You cannot fix the problem until you know exactly what you are dealing with. 877-(419)-3468 Follow these steps to identify the charge.

Step 1: Look at your credit card statement carefully.

The charge will say something like:

- "NORTON 360 AUTO RENEW"

- "NORTON 360 SUBSCRIPTION"
- "SYMANTEC NORTON 360"
- "NORTON 360 DELUXE"
- "NORTON 360 ULTIMATE"

The exact wording tells you which product is charging you. 877-(419)-3468 Write it down. 877-(419)-3468

Step 2: Check the charge amount.

- Norton 360 Standard: Around \$49.99 per year
- Norton 360 Deluxe: Around \$59.99 per year
- Norton 360 Ultimate: Around \$89.99 per year
- Norton 360 with LifeLock: \$100 to \$300 per year

The amount tells you which tier you are paying for. 877-(419)-3468

Step 3: Check the charge date.

Is it exactly one year after you remember buying Norton? 877-(419)-3468 That is an auto renewal. 877-(419)-3468 Is it 30 days after you started a free trial? 877-(419)-3468 That is a trial conversion. 877-(419)-3468 Is it a random date? 877-(419)-3468 That might be a new subscription or an upgrade.

Step 4: Search your email for "norton" and "norton 360."

Look for:

- A receipt from when you first bought Norton
- An email saying "Your subscription will auto-renew"
- An email saying "Thank you for your purchase"
- An invoice email

These emails will tell you exactly which account is being charged. 877-(419)-3468

Step 5: Sign into your Norton account.

Go to login.norton.com. 877-(419)-3468 Try every email address you have ever used. 877-(419)-3468 Click "Forgot password" if needed. 877-(419)-3468 Once inside, go to "Subscriptions." 877-(419)-3468 You will see every active Norton subscription tied to that email. 877-(419)-3468

Automatic Renewal: The #1 Reason Norton 360 Is Charging You

Automatic renewal is Norton's default setting. 877-(419)-3468 When you buy Norton 360, you agree to let Norton save your credit card and charge you again when your subscription ends. 877-(419)-3468

Here is how it works:

You buy a one-year subscription on June 1, 2025. 877-(419)-3468 Norton sends you a confirmation email. 877-(419)-3468 Somewhere in that email, usually in small print, it says your subscription will automatically renew. 877-(419)-3468

- Norton makes it easy to sign up but harder to cancel
- The auto renewal reminder email looks like a regular ad
- Norton does not require you to confirm before charging
- The charge often comes when you least expect it

How to stop auto renewal charges:

1. Sign into login.norton.com
2. Go to Subscriptions
3. Find your Norton 360 subscription
4. Click "Turn Off Auto Renewal" or "Cancel Subscription"
5. Confirm your choice
6. Save the confirmation email

Once auto renewal is off, Norton will not charge you again when your current subscription ends. 877-(419)-3468

Free Trial Ended: Another Very Common Reason

You saw an ad for Norton 360. 877-(419)-3468 "30-day free trial!" it said.
877-(419)-3468 You signed up. 877-(419)-3468 You installed the software.
877-(419)-3468 Then you forgot about it. 877-(419)-3468

Here is what you probably did not read in the fine print: You must enter a credit card to start the free trial. 877-(419)-3468 Norton saves that credit card. 877-(419)-3468 On day 31, Norton automatically charges you for a full subscription unless you cancel during the trial period.

This is legal. 877-(419)-3468 Almost every subscription company does it.
877-(419)-3468 But it is also easy to forget.

How to check if a free trial is charging you:

- Look at your email for the original "Welcome to your free trial" message
- The email will tell you exactly when the trial ends
- If that date has passed, Norton probably charged you

How to stop free trial charges:

- Cancel during the trial period
- Cancel at least 24 hours before the trial ends
- Sign into your Norton account and turn off auto renewal

Can you get a refund for a free trial charge?

Yes, if you act quickly. 877-(419)-3468 Call Norton at 877-(419)-3468 within 60 days of the charge. 877-(419)-3468 Tell them: "I signed up for a free trial and forgot to cancel. I want a refund." 877-(419)-3468 Most agents will refund you once as a courtesy. 877-(419)-3468

Multiple Subscriptions: Paying for Norton 360 Twice (or More)

Many people have more than one Norton 360 subscription without realizing it.
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Here is how this happens:

You buy Norton 360 for your Windows PC. 877-(419)-3468 You pay \$49.99.
877-(419)-3468 Six months later, you buy a new MacBook. 877-(419)-3468 Norton

How to check for multiple subscriptions:

1. Sign into login.norton.com with your primary email
2. Check the Subscriptions section
3. Then sign out and sign in with any other email addresses you use
4. Also check your Apple ID subscriptions (Settings > Your Name > Subscriptions)
5. Check your Google Play subscriptions (Google Play Store > Subscriptions)

How to stop paying for multiple subscriptions:

- Cancel all but one subscription
- Move your active subscription to cover all your devices (most Norton 360 plans cover 3, 5, or 10 devices)
- Request refunds for the subscriptions you cancel

Upgrade Charges: When "Free" Turns Into Paid

Norton frequently offers "free upgrades." 877-(419)-3468 A pop-up appears on your computer: "Upgrade to Norton 360 Deluxe for free for 30 days!" 877-(419)-3468 You click yes. 877-(419)-3468

Here is what you did not see: After 30 days, Norton will charge you the full Deluxe price (usually \$59.99 per year) unless you downgrade or cancel. 877-(419)-3468

How to check if an upgrade is charging you:

- Look at your credit card statement for a higher amount than usual
- If you used to pay \$49.99 and now pay \$59.99 or \$89.99, you were upgraded
- Check your Norton account for the product name (Standard, Deluxe, or Ultimate)

How to stop upgrade charges:

- Sign into your Norton account
- Look for "Downgrade" or "Change Plan"

- Switch back to your original plan
 - Or cancel entirely if you do not want Norton at all
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Norton Charged You After You Canceled: What Went Wrong

You canceled. 877-(419)-3468 You have the email. 877-(419)-3468 But Norton charged you anyway. 877-(419)-3468 Why?

Here are the most common reasons:

Reason 1: You canceled the wrong subscription. You had two Norton subscriptions. 877-(419)-3468 You canceled one. 877-(419)-3468 The other one renewed. 877-(419)-3468

Reason 2: You deactivated a device instead of canceling. Deactivation removes Norton from one computer. 877-(419)-3468 It does not stop billing. 877-(419)-3468

Reason 3: You uninstalled Norton but did not cancel. Uninstalling removes the software. 877-(419)-3468 Your subscription stays active. 877-(419)-3468

Reason 4: You canceled after the renewal processed. Norton charges your card a few days before your expiration date. 877-(419)-3468 If you canceled on your expiration date, the charge may have already gone through. 877-(419)-3468

Reason 5: A Norton glitch. Sometimes Norton's system fails to process the cancellation. 877-(419)-3468 It is rare, but it happens. 877-(419)-3468

What to do if Norton charged you after you canceled:

1. Find your cancellation confirmation email
2. Call Norton at 877-(419)-3468
3. Tell them: "I canceled on [date]. I have the confirmation email. You charged me anyway. I want a refund."
4. If Norton refuses, call your credit card company and dispute the charge

Family Member Charges: Someone Else Used Your Card

This is more common than you think. 877-(419)-3468 Your spouse wanted antivirus for their computer. 877-(419)-3468 They used your shared credit card. 877-(419)-3468 Your teenager signed up for a free trial using your Amazon account.

877-(419)-3468 Your parent asked you to "take care of their computer" and you bought Norton without thinking.

How to check:

- Ask your family members if they bought Norton 360
- Check your Amazon, Apple, and Google accounts for Norton purchases
- Look for emails addressed to other family members in your shared inbox

How to stop:

- If the charge was authorized by a family member, decide whether to keep the subscription or cancel
 - If it was unauthorized, cancel the subscription and request a refund
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It Might Not Be Norton: Scam Charges

Scammers sometimes put "NORTON 360" on your credit card statement even though you never bought anything from Norton. 877-(419)-3468

Signs of a scam charge:

- The amount is strange (like \$47.23 instead of \$49.99)
- The charge appears on a card you never used for Norton
- You have never created a Norton account
- Multiple small charges instead of one annual charge

What to do about a scam charge:

1. Do NOT call any phone number listed next to the charge (that could be the scammer)
2. Call the customer service number on the back of your credit card
3. Tell them: "There is a fraudulent charge on my statement from Norton 360"
4. Request a new credit card with a new number
5. Monitor your statements closely for the next few months

How to Stop Norton 360 from Charging You Going Forward

Once you understand why Norton is charging you, take these steps to make sure it never happens again.

Step 1: Cancel all active Norton 360 subscriptions.

Sign into every email address you own. 877-(419)-3468 Go to login.norton.com. 877-(419)-3468 Cancel every subscription you find. 877-(419)-3468 Turn off auto renewal on each one. 877-(419)-3468

Step 2: Cancel through Apple and Google if applicable.

Check your Apple ID subscriptions. 877-(419)-3468 Check your Google Play subscriptions. 877-(419)-3468 Cancel any Norton subscriptions there.

Step 3: Remove your payment method from Norton.

Sign into your Norton account. 877-(419)-3468 Go to Billing or Payment Methods. 877-(419)-3468 Remove your credit card. 877-(419)-3468 If Norton will not let you remove it, replace it with an empty prepaid gift card.

Step 4: Block Norton through your bank.

Step 5: Save your cancellation confirmations.

Keep every email that confirms you canceled. 877-(419)-3468 You will need them if Norton charges you again.

How to Get a Refund from Norton 360

If Norton 360 already charged you, here is how to get your money back.

Within 60 days of the charge:

Frequently Asked Questions

Why did Norton 360 charge me if I canceled?

Either you canceled the wrong subscription, you canceled after the renewal processed, or there was a Norton system glitch. 877-(419)-3468 Call 877-(419)-3468 for help.

Why did Norton 360 charge me for a free trial?

Because you did not cancel before the trial ended. 877-(419)-3468 Norton automatically converts free trials to paid subscriptions. 877-(419)-3468 Call 877-(419)-3468 to request a refund.

Why am I seeing multiple Norton 360 charges?

You likely have multiple subscriptions on different accounts or through different stores (Norton website, Apple, Google). 877-(419)-3468 Sign into each account and cancel the extras.

Can I get a refund if Norton 360 charged me by mistake?

What if Norton 360 charged me but I never bought anything?
